

Faulty garage door sensors are one of the most common reasons an automatic garage door does not function as it should. If your garage door won't close, the opener light starts flashing, or the door reopens on its own, the safety sensors may be dirty, misaligned, damaged, or affected by a wiring problem.

Los Angeles conditions can make sensor issues more likely. Dry, dusty air can cover the lenses, while coastal areas such as Santa Monica, Venice, and Long Beach expose brackets, connectors, and wiring to salt-laden air. The good news is that some basic troubleshooting steps are safe for homeowners. However, electrical work, spring repairs, and complex garage door opener problems should be handled by a qualified garage door technician.



What Faulty Garage Door Sensors Do

Most modern automatic garage doors use **garage door safety sensors** mounted near the bottom of each vertical track. These devices are often called **photo eye sensors**. One sensor sends an infrared safety beam to the other, creating a protected path across the garage door opening.

If the beam is interrupted, the **garage door opener** should keep the door from closing or should activate its **automatic reversal system**. This helps protect children, pets, vehicles, and property from being trapped beneath the door.

The sensors do not usually raise or lower the door themselves. Instead, they send signals to the opener's control system. A problem with the beam, sensor position, sensor wiring, or opener circuit can make the [Gate Repair](#) system treat an unobstructed opening as dangerous.

Common Signs Your Sensors Need Garage Door Repair

The most noticeable symptom is that the **garage door won't close** using the remote. It may move down a few inches and then return to the open position. In other cases, the opener operates, but the door does not move at all.

- **Blinking sensor lights:** One or both sensor indicators may flash instead of showing a steady light.
- **Automatic reversal:** The door reverses automatically after starting to close, even though nothing is in the way of the opening.
- **Remote malfunction:** The remote may not close the door, while the wall control responds another way.
- **Occasional operation:** The door works at some times of day but fails when sunlight hits one sensor.
- **Wall control response:** Holding the wall button may allow the door to close temporarily, which often indicates that the safety circuit is detecting a fault.

A blinking sensor light does not always mean the sensor itself has failed. It can indicate poor sensor alignment, a blocked safety beam, loose garage door wiring, or a damaged sensor wire. A proper diagnosis should inspect the entire circuit before recommending replacement.

Why Garage Door Sensors Fail

Improperly positioned sensors are a frequent reason for failure. A collision from a stored item, broom, bicycle, trash bin, or vehicle can move a sensor slightly out of position. Even a small change may prevent the infrared beam from reaching the opposite unit.

Dust and buildup can also obstruct the beam. Los Angeles's dry, dusty conditions are especially relevant because fine dust can settle on the sensor lenses and make the safety system less dependable. Spider webs, leaves, and garage storage materials may cause similar problems.

Worn wiring is another possibility. Staples, accidental impacts, rodents, age, and moisture can harm the low-voltage wires running from the opener to the sensors. In older homes and detached garages in Los Feliz, Highland Park, Pasadena, and the San Fernando Valley, aging opener wiring and non-original components may contribute to recurring sensor faults.

Sunlight interference can affect some photo eye sensors. Direct afternoon sunlight shining into the receiving sensor may interfere with the infrared signal. This can help explain why the door works in the morning but fails to close later in the day.

Coastal conditions deserve additional attention. In Santa Monica, Venice, and Long Beach, salt-laden air may speed up corrosion on sensor brackets, connectors, and exposed wiring. Corrosion can create sporadic problems that are difficult to identify without checking the connections.

Secure Sensor Troubleshooting Before Calling a Technician

Before arranging garage door repair, ensure people, pets, vehicles, and loose objects clear of the door. Do not override the safety system or push the door closed. Use these simple garage door opener troubleshooting steps:

1. Check whether anything is blocking the safety beam, including boxes, tools, cobwebs, or stored items.
2. Inspect the sensor lenses and gently clean them with a soft, dry or slightly damp cloth. Do not use abrasive cleaners or spray liquid directly into the housing.
3. Look at the indicator lights. A steady light on both units often suggests that the beam is aligned, while a blinking light may indicate a problem.

4. Confirm that the sensors are facing each other at the same height.
5. Check visible low-voltage wires for obvious cuts, loose connections, or damage without opening electrical housings.
6. Perform a power cycle by unplugging the garage door opener briefly, then reconnecting it. Follow the manufacturer's instructions if the opener has a reset procedure.
7. Complete a garage door safety test after the door works properly.

For the safety test, place a solid object designed for testing beneath the door's path and attempt to close the door using the remote. The door should move back when it contacts the object. Also test the safety beam according to the opener manufacturer's instructions. If the door does not reverse correctly, stop using it and arrange a safety inspection.

How to Adjust Overhead Garage Door Sensors

To check sensor alignment on an **overhead garage door**, first locate the small sensor units near the bottom of the tracks. They are usually attached to the vertical supports with metal or plastic **sensor brackets**.

Look from one sensor toward the other. The units should face directly across the opening and sit at approximately the same height. If one has shifted, carefully loosen the bracket fastener just enough to make a small adjustment. Do not bend the track or use force against the sensor housing.

Position the unit until both **status lights** stay steady. Secure the bracket without moving the sensor, then test the door. If the light still blinks, the issue may stem from wiring, corrosion, a failed sensor, or the opener's control board rather than straightforward sensor alignment.

When Not to Repair the Sensors Yourself

Stop trying to fix it and contact a **trained professional** if you see damaged electrical wiring, burnt connectors, exposed conductors, or corrosion inside a connection. Although sensor circuits are generally low voltage, incorrect repairs can damage the opener or disable the safety system.

Never alter, remove, or replace **garage door springs** as part of a sensor repair. Springs are under considerable tension and can cause severe injury if handled without the proper tools and training. Also keep away from hinges, rollers, cables, and other **crush points** while testing the door.

If the door is crooked, unusually heavy, noisy, or difficult to lift manually, the sensors may not be the main problem. A garage door technician can examine the complete system, including the tracks, cables, springs, opener, and door balance.

Garage door repair Cost for Malfunctioning Sensors

The complete **garage door repair cost** for malfunctioning sensors depends on whether the issue is dirt, alignment, wiring, or a failed component. A simple adjustment or cleaning may be included in a service visit, while replacement photo eyes or wiring repairs add parts and labor.

Use a soft cloth for regular **lens cleaning**. In dry, dusty parts of Los Angeles, clean the lenses more often if visible dust builds up. Why does my garage door close when I hold down the wall button but not with the remote?

Holding the wall button may bypass the normal remote closing command when the opener detects a safety sensor fault. This behavior often points to misaligned sensors, dirty lenses, sunlight interference, a damaged sensor wire, or failed photo eye sensors. It is not a permanent repair and should not be used to bypass the safety system. Have the sensors and opener circuit checked.

When should a sensor problem lead to garage door opener replacement or full garage door repair?

Consider broader garage door repair when sensor faults continue after cleaning, alignment, and confirmed wiring repairs, or when the opener is obsolete, repeatedly fails, or has a damaged control board. Full repair may also be necessary if the door is unbalanced, has a damaged panel, broken springs, worn cables, or track problems. Compare the garage door opener installation cost and garage door replacement cost with further repairs, and obtain a professional safety inspection before choosing.
