Is Iceland Cold Enough to Make Pit Stops Urgent?

Icelandic is the official language, though nearly everyone speaks English fluently. Bathroom signs usually show universal symbols anyway. Just look for "Salerni" if you see Icelandic text.

Do You Tip in Iceland for Restroom Access?

Do you tip in Iceland? Not really, definitely not for bathroom access. Most public restrooms cost nothing at gas stations with tourist attractions. Some remote locations might charge a small fee, though tipping isn't expected.

Smart Planning Tips

Download offline maps before losing cell service. Mark gas stations on your route since they're your best bet for clean facilities.
