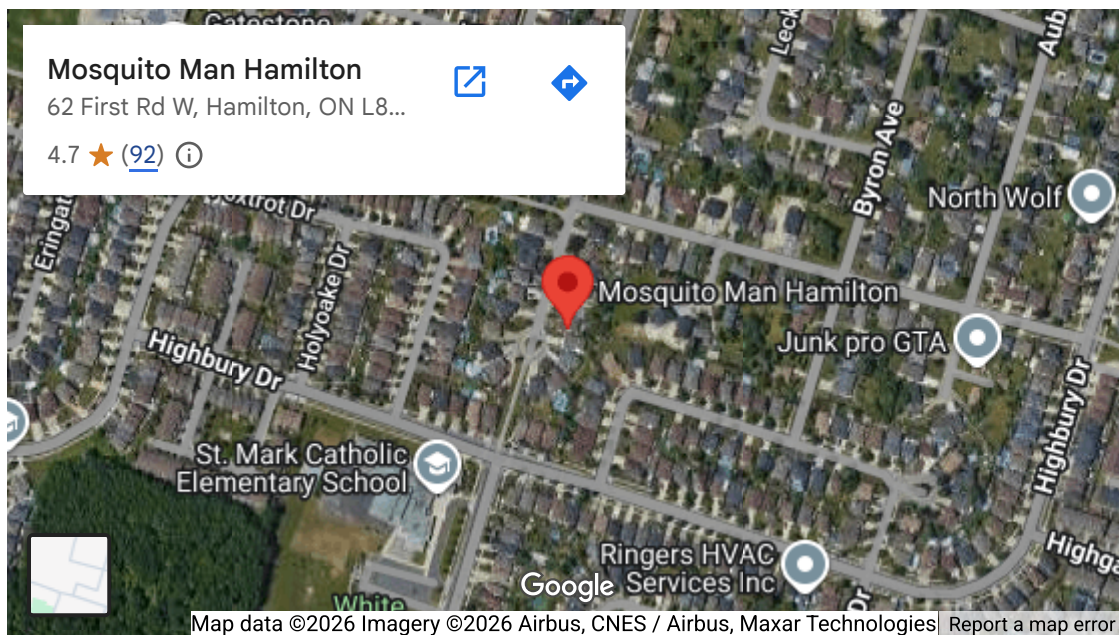




Why infestations are so common in Hamilton, ON

How weather, moisture, and property age attract pests
