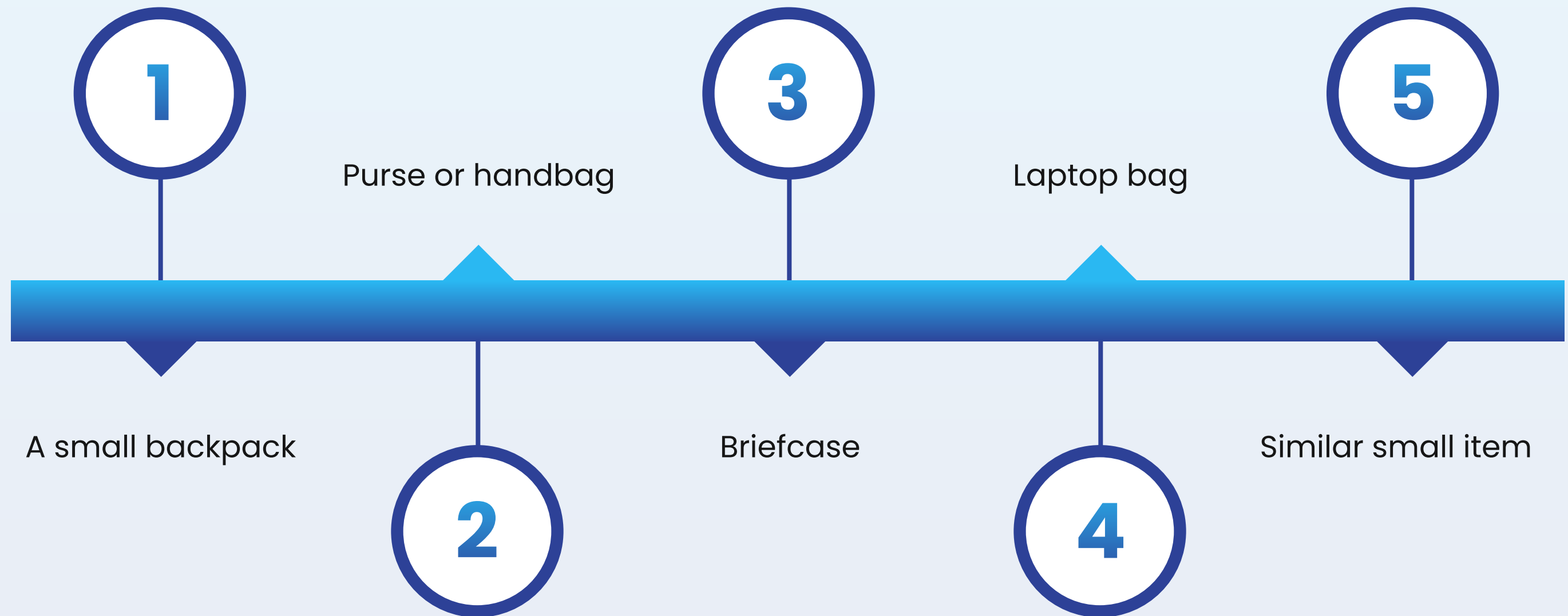
Your exact allowance can vary based on your itinerary and fare. Always review the baggage conditions associated with your reservation before traveling.



Personal Items

The personal item should be small enough to fit safely under the seat in front of you. Keeping frequently needed items in your personal item can make the flight more convenient.

If you are traveling with medication, identification, electronics, or important documents, consider placing them in your personal item rather than checked luggage.

Carry-On Baggage

Carry-on baggage is designed to fit in the aircraft's overhead storage compartment. Alaska Airlines has specific size requirements for carry-on bags, and travelers should measure their luggage before leaving for the airport. A typical carry-on suitcase should fit within the airline's published dimensions, including wheels and handles. Because aircraft storage capacity can vary, passengers should always check the latest requirements for their flight. Avoid overpacking your carry-on because an oversized bag may need to be checked.
