

Why do pests become more active when temperatures rise?

Seasonal pest activity is closely tied to changing temperatures, and that is especially noticeable across Scarborough homes once the weather turns mild. During colder months, many pests enter winter dormancy or reduce movement to conserve energy and improve survival. As temperatures rise in spring, their insect metabolism speeds up, which supports feeding, reproduction, and overall increased activity.

This shift is part of the pest life cycle. Warm weather creates favourable conditions for survival, so species that stayed hidden through winter begin foraging more aggressively and looking for nesting sites. As breeding cycles restart, population growth can happen quickly, turning a small presence into a larger infestation if preventive measures are not taken early.

That moisture can support pest pressure by making it easier for insects and rodents to find water, shelter, and access to food sources. Which pests are most common in Scarborough during spring and summer?

A number of species become especially apparent across Scarborough during the warmer season. The most common are ants, mosquitoes, wasps, and rodents, but cockroaches and spiders can also become more visible indoors and around the property.

Ants are among the earliest pests many homeowners notice after the spring thaw. They start foraging for food sources as soon as the ground warms, and even small crumbs or pet food can act as attractants. In kitchens, basements, and along foundations, ants often follow established trails into Scarborough homes.

Cockroaches may not always be the first pest people think of in summer, but they take advantage of warmth, moisture, and food residues. **Spiders** also become more visible because they follow insect prey into garages, basements, and entryways.

This is common because Scarborough’s local climate, neighbourhood density, and varied housing stock create numerous opportunities for pest survival and reproduction.

How the weather in Scarborough and local area conditions affect pest pressure

Scarborough's closeness to **Lake Ontario** plays a real role in seasonal pest activity. The lake can add humidity to the local climate, which supports pest activity by producing more favourable conditions for insects and other wildlife. High humidity helps many pests stay active longer and can also make outdoor spaces feel more inviting to them.

Rainfall is another important factor. In the Greater Toronto Area, spring thaw and early-summer rain patterns can increase moisture around foundations, patios, fences, and garden edges. That extra water helps mosquitoes breed and can also draw ants and rodents toward structural gaps where they can find shelter. When the ground stays damp, pests have easier access to water and harborage.

Urban landscaping also influences pest behaviour. Dense shrubs, stacked firewood, overgrown hedges, and untrimmed tree branches can create protected routes and nesting sites. In parks, ravines, gardens, and other green spaces, pest populations often establish themselves before moving into nearby residential blocks. Older homes are especially vulnerable because they may have more gaps, aging materials, and hidden access points. These local conditions make integrated pest management particularly effective. A targeted approach that combines monitoring, exclusion, sanitation, and habitat reduction is often more effective than waiting for pests to become a visible problem.

Why pests enter homes more often in warmer months

Nesting signs can include shredded paper, insulation disturbance, mud tubes, webbing, or hidden piles of debris. Rodents and some insects build nests in quiet, undisturbed areas where they can reproduce safely.
